

PASTOR'S NOTES

Holy Week

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Welcome to Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week! Today we begin the holiest week of the year for the Catholic Church. This week the Church commemorates Christ's death and burial which begins with Palm Sunday. The palms symbolize peace and victory. It was custom during Jesus' time for people to pay homage by laying palm branches—or even clothes—in front of people who were owed a great amount of respect. The Gospel of John tells of how Jesus was welcomed into the city mere days before his death: "When the great crowd that had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, they took palm branches and went out to meet him, and cried out: 'Hosanna! Blessed is



he who comes in the name of the Lord, (even) the king of Israel" (John 12: 12-13) On Palm Sunday, the faithful receive palm branches at the beginning of Mass followed by a procession. Doing so invites us to reenact Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem. Also, the blessed palms at Mass on Sunday, should not be thrown away. According to Canon Law (1171), blessed items are to be treated with reverence. If there is a need to dispose of such items, they must be buried or burned.

Ancient writers called this the Great or Holy Week of Our Lord's Passion. The custom of keeping the Holy Week goes all the way back to the time of the Apostles. When the early Christians spoke about Jesus to others, they started with the Passion of Our Lord. Scholars believe that the Passion of Our Lord spread before the other parts of the Gospel were even written down. The Passion of Our Lord is really the starting point for building our relationship with Jesus.

On Passion or Palm Sunday, the more solemn part of the penitential season begins. The images in our church are veiled in purple wrappings marking this week in a unique way. On Holy Thursday - when we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper at 7:00pm – the Church commemorates the institution of the Holy Eucharist and the Priesthood. It is followed by a solemn procession to an altar Ramada for adoration until midnight. On Good Friday the Church commemorates the death of Our Blessed Savior on Mount Calvary for the sins of humanity. On this day we will have the "Veneration of the Cross" at 3:00pm in which we venerate a relic of the True Cross as a sign of our love for Jesus followed by the Stations of the Cross at 7:00pm. On Holy Saturday, we celebrate the Triumph of Our Lord's resurrection from the dead and the Church welcome catechumens into the Church. This will begin with the Easter Fire in the courtyard at 8:00 pm. Easter Sunday morning is the feast of **Our Lord's Resurrection** and the victory of life over death and the moment of our salvation. Masses will be at 6:00am, 8:00am, 8:15am (in the gym) 10:00am, 10:15am (in the gym).

Why do we focus on Jesus' suffering? Our Lord's Passion acknowledges the suffering of humanity and gives meaning to suffering. However great or small our suffering is, we are united to Christ's suffering. God draws especially close to those who are suffering. We all undergo trials, but the question is not whether you or I will suffer. The real question is what will you do with your trials? Will you join them to His - or give in to bitterness?

Let us remember the Passion of Our Lord... not because suffering has the last word. It does not! We recall Our Lord's Passion because our faith points to something beyond our suffering. Christians throughout history knew that everything did not end at the tomb. If that was the end, then it would be tragic and heartbreaking. As a people of faith, we see beyond Christ's final agony and so we can see beyond all agony.

As God's beloved children we know there is much more to life than death. Because of Christ's suffering and death, our suffering now has great value. Join us this Holy Week as we relive the great events of our faith in Christ's suffering, death and resurrection.



THE TRIDUUM



The Triduum Is Special

The Easter Triduum, marking the days of Jesus' passion and resurrection, is the summit of the Church's liturgical year. Beginning on Holy Thursday with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper, it is continued through Good Friday with the celebration of the passion of the Lord, and reaches its high point on Holy Saturday in the Easter vigil, and concludes with evening prayer on Easter Sunday. It is actually one liturgy that spans three days.

Prepared by the days of Lent, Christians celebrate on these holiest of days the saving work God has accomplished in Christ. From the events remembered on these days, so sorrowful and so joyful, the church learns the deepest lessons. In rites and words the mysteries of Jesus' final hours are present with us, his passion, his cruel suffering, his rising from the dead. And we discover the answer to age old questions: Does God love us? Is God merciful? Does God care for us? We have only to look and learn from Jesus Christ.

These are the days for fixing our eyes on the holy mystery of his cross and filling our ears with the words of his gospel. Nowhere else does

God's love appear so vividly. In the love shown by Christ for a sinful world, we find the beginning of our Church, the source of our sacraments, the key to understanding the human story, and our hope for eternal life.

The Season of Lent ends before evening prayer on Thursday of Holy Week. Then the Church remembers the death and resurrection of Jesus during the Easter Triduum.

Holy Thursday

On Holy Thursday, we remember the Last Supper and how Jesus gave himself in the Eucharist. We recall that Jesus chose his apostles to serve and lead the Church. Remembering that Jesus washed their feet at the Last Supper, the priest washes the feet of members of the congregation. Holy Thursday is a special day for all priests, since it is a day to mark the beginning of the ordained priesthood.

The evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday is a beautiful and joyful celebration. During the singing of the Gloria, the church bells are rung and then remain silent until the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night. Because Holy Thursday is a feast day of the Blessed Sacrament, there is a procession of the Eucharist after the Mass to an altar of repose set up for this special occasion. Then the main altar is stripped bare and the main tabernacle is left empty.

Good Friday

On Good Friday, we remember the death of Our Lord, Jesus. According to an ancient custom, Mass is not celebrated on this day or before the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday. The celebration of the Lord's passion and death takes place in the afternoon. There are three parts to the liturgy of the day: the Liturgy of the Word; the Veneration of the Cross; and Holy Communion with Hosts that were consecrated on Holy Thursday.

Easter Vigil

During the day of Holy Saturday, the Church meditates on the suffering and death of Jesus. Then that night, the Church gathers to celebrate the Easter Vigil. The celebration of the Easter Vigil begins after nightfall and ends before the dawn of Sunday. It includes the blessing of the fire, the blessing & lighting of the Paschal candle, readings from creation to the Resurrection, and the celebration of the baptism of the elect.



GOSPEL REFLECTION



Blessed Is the King Who Comes in the Name of the Lord

Does the King of glory find a welcome entry in your home and heart? Jesus went to Jerusalem knowing full well what awaited him - betrayal, rejection, and crucifixion. The people of Jerusalem, however, were ready to hail him as their Messianic King! Little did they know what it would cost this king to usher in his kingdom. Jesus' entry into Jerusalem astride a colt was a direct fulfillment of the Messianic prophecy of Zechariah (9:9):

Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion. Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem. Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he, and riding on an donkey and upon a colt the foal of a donkey.

Those who believe, hope, and love receive Christ's kingdom of peace and eternal life

The colt was a sign of peace. Jesus enters Jerusalem in meekness and humility, as the Messianic King who offers victory and peace to his people. That victory and peace would be secured in the cross and resurrection which would soon take place at the time of Passover.

Augustine, the great 5th century church father, comments on the significance of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem:

"The master of humility is Christ who humbled himself and became obedient even to death, even the death of the cross. Thus he does not lose his divinity when he teaches us humility... What great thing was it to the king of the ages to become the king of humanity? For Christ was not the king of Israel so that he might exact a tax or equip an army with weaponry and visibly vanquish an enemy. He was the king of Israel in that he rules minds, in that he gives counsel for eternity, in that he leads into the kingdom of heaven for those who believe, hope, and love. It is a condescension, not an advancement for one who is the Son of God, equal to the Father, the Word through whom all things were made, to become king of Israel. It is an indication of pity, not an increase in power." (Tractates on John 51.3-4)

Psalm 24 is another prophetic passage which echoes this triumphal procession of the King of glory:

Lift up your heads, O gates! and be lifted up, O ancient doors! that the King of glory may come in.

Jesus Christ came to bring us the kingdom of God. He is the true King who offers peace, joy, and everlasting life for those who accept his kingship. Does the King of glory find a welcome entry in your heart and home? Do your walls echo with the praise of his glory?
